
North Group Fundraising

A Splash of Spring - Exhibition Review by Lauren

The exhibition was in a small shop, which was a gift store with a café. The exhibition was in its own room and the artists were there finishing setting up.

It looked welcoming from the outside and it was a nice place – the building was pretty, there was flowers on the door and signs showing you where to go.

There was a lot of art everywhere! On the walls, on shelves, tables and a rack of cards. I have seen art galleries before and the art was all on the walls and very spaced out, so this was different, but I thought it suited the artwork as it was all quite homely stuff – the majority of the pieces were things people might have bought to have in their homes. In fact, I bought a piece of the pebble art with the flowers! This was the first piece of artwork I have ever bought. It's cute and I love the little robin which was painted on the pebble. I'd really like to be able to draw the flowers like that, and that was partly why I bought it.






This is Mandy Renton's artwork. She has an obsession with birds! She had quite a lot of Australian birds – which I asked her about, and she said that she'd never been to Australia but that she is in social media groups about bird art and has lots of friends who are Australian.

She uses a lot of pastel in the background of her works, but most of them are bright and bold. The works are very detailed, with lots of little details on the birds, but the backgrounds are blended and not as detailed. That makes the bird the main focus.

She mostly uses oil paints and acrylics paints on canvases. Some of her work was printed cushions and mugs, and cards. The cushions was very nice to touch, very soft velvety texture.

The pastel artwork of the budgie is so bold and detailed. It's really good. Mandy told me that the bird is called Rosco and she uses him as inspiration and he helps her sell artwork — she uses him on social media with speech bubbles, and calls him her 'marketing manager'. She uses a lot of humour. She had also got some cards of paintings she had done of other birds but in the style of artists like Van Gogh, Andy Warhol and Picasso.









This is Marian Lishman's artwork. It is very marbelley, and a modern type — not entirely detailed but it has a meaning to her. They make me think of the ocean, beaches and the sea. It's not really my kind of thing — it's bold with the colours and simple but it's a bit cold and maybe a bit too clean. I like nature and animals and I really liked her sunflower one.

A lot of these artworks are made with resin on canvas.

I thought that these artworks were not at all related to spring.

I loved this painting of the sunflowers straight away, it caught my eye instantly.

It's bright yellow and a simple design. She has used the marbling aesthetic in the background and she uses this marbling a lot in her other pieces — it seems like her signature.

This was one of the most spring like things in the exhibition!







This artist was my favourite! Jenne paints on pebbles with quite a lot of detail. She said she took inspiration from Gallery Thea in Southwold for her drawing style. I want to go and visit Gallery Thea.

The exhibition was called 'A Splash of Spring' but even the artists saidthat they had only followed that loosely. There were a couple of things that were spring like – there were paintings of flowers and there were animals – a painting of a fox and an owl, and then all the birds made it feel a bit like spring. But it seemed that they had chosen the name because of the season the exhibition was in, rather than a theme for the work inside it, so I think the title of the exhibition was a bit misleading and I was expecting different artworks.

To enhance the display, they had lights specifically pointing at artworks, and there were big windows that provided a lot of light. They also had a tub of flowers which was like a tiny garden, which gave it another little spring like feel. It made it feel homely and comfortable. It was also good as there wasn't loads of people and this made me feel more comfortable.

I would recommend the exhibition to others if they like that type of style, and especially if they like birds! If you are in the area then it would be worth going to but I wouldn't travel miles.

When I was there, I learnt about how different people express their art and creativity in different ways – all three of them had completely different styles.

Did you know that the walls in the tower are 3m thick?





With Lapwing I have been learning how to cook basic meals. I have found the most useful tool in all of this has been the frying pan and considering how easy it is to use I think it's an important skill to learn and not hard at all.

Scrambled Egg 1

Crack 2-3 eggs, best in a measuring jug, and whisk with a fork. Once done; you shouldn't have to whisk for long, pour it into the frying pan. Now use a metal/wooden spatula to separate the eggs once it starts to set in the pan. Do this until all of the egg has set and there's no liquid left, then you should be done! I recommend having toast with this for a good breakfast!



Tips: In all of these you should preheat the frying pan and add either butter or some kind of cooking oil/spray, if your stove is gas then it'll heat up quicker! You should of course ask an adult how your individual stove works as all can be different!



Bacon

Lay out the bacon on the pan and prepare a spatula, it'll shrink so don't worry if you can't fit all the bacon you want at first! Move the bacon around the pan and wait for the fat on the side to start to brown. Once it has, flip over the bacon, remember if it doesn't cook as much as you like you can flip it again and cook it for longer. Now cook it for a few more minutes until both sides look equally cooked and then you're done! While this might sound overwhelming to just 'cook until it's done', it really is a case of trying and once you get it right once, you know what to do!

Omelette

Similar to the scrambled eggs, whisk 2-3 eggs in a measuring jug and grate some cheese. You can add a variety of ingredients to an omelette, but just cheese is a good place to start! Pour the egg into the frying pan. Once the egg has started to set, drag a side from the edge into the middle using a metal spatula, pick up the pan and move the liquid egg into the space left behind. Repeat this on different edges until the egg has fully set. Once all is set, pour the grated cheese onto the egg and wait for it to melt into the egg. Now put your spatula underneath one side of the egg and attempt to flip it on top of the other, don't panic if this goes wrong! This is mostly cosmetic and doesn't affect the taste, as long as the two sides are on top of each other its fine! Now move it onto a plate and you're done!




Visit to Colchester Castle

- I had a dream......




Creative writing by BF

Versatile as ever, Eddie shifted the focus back onto the matter at hand.


"What should we do then? Raid the KitKat factory?" He asked.

The Beyond the Reeds art exhibition was an exhibition at Snape Maltings in the Dovecote studio. Focusing on the wildlife and Minsmere run by the Suffolk craft society. They started the exhibit in Snape Maltings then they are going to move on in the summer to Minsmere and display the works as a trail during the summer of 2023. After that they will be moving on to Southwold.





This is a tapestry. This tapestry uses a lot of cool colours for the sky with warm colours for what looks like the sun. It has hints of green for the grass and some light rays. Of course, it isn't finished without some birds that strangely look like lapwings! This was created by Liz Chester.





This is our favourite piece, it is a mosaic of the water, some ducks and some reeds. I especially like the marble effect created with the ceramic tile at the back. It is a marble with a light blue, medium blue, dark blue and white. It reminds me of when you marble fondant, yes it makes me hungry! I can't imagine how long it took and how mad you would be if you broke a piece as you were putting it in.



This is another weaving piece using a lot of thread and some nice blues and whites with the occasional hint of red. It looks like a tartan piece of fabric to make a kilt.



This is an information plaque with lots of details about all of the makers from the Suffolk craft society explaining some of the techniques they use and some of their other pieces of work.

In conclusion it was smaller than expected but it was very educational to see different art variations based on the same themes and seeing how other people interpret the world around us. They all used more cool colours than warm colours, so more blues than reds.



Interview with Lapwing student, Arohn

Can you start by telling me a little about your Lapwing journey.

I started with Lapwing in September 2022 and have been studying English and maths. I also did my CSCS card (CSCS stands for the Construction Skills Certification Scheme) and you need it to be able to work on building sites.

I had to learn about the rules of working on site, the different hazards including gas, fire, electricity and slips trips and falls.

To get the card you must take a test and achieve a score of at least 45/50. When the card comes through you do an induction and go through the rules of the site with a site manager.

I also did work experience with Ben Burgess in Norwich who sell John Deere tractors and farm machinery and Cookes Music Shop in Norwich.

What did you learn about yourself this year?

I'm much more mature and I find it easier to work and get things done. I don't give up so easily now because I believe in myself much more. I'm really proud that I got the CSCS card and was able to start a part time placement at a building site in Wymondham.





Tell us about what you do on the building site.

When I arrive, I have to sign in and then have a coffee so I'm awake! Then I put my hi vis jacket on. I will already have my steel cap boots and hard hat on. I also wear gloves to protect my hands, but you don't have to wear them. Then I crack on with work. On my first day I started off by cleaning and sweeping up fallen cement and dust. Then I helped to put some scaffolding together which means that I had to put poles together with brackets and then tighten it up with a wrench. We made sure that they were straight with a leveller.

I stacked the concrete blocks into groups of 4 and then I swept up again. I also had to get a trowel and fill some gaps with some cement. I had to learn how to take some cement, make it workable and scoop it up. This is a basic bricklaying skill. At the end of my shift, we were all given an ice cream, it was a really hot day. I'm working with two bricklayers. One is called Duct tape (his nickname) and James and I'm learning from them so that I can eventually become a bricklayer too which is what I really want to do.




I get to communicate with people and a laugh together. I can make friends with other bricklayers, and I really like helping out. I don't think that I would have been able to do all of this before I joined Lapwing.











My plan is to carry on learning so that I can get a paid job on a building site. I've got my provisional driving license and I want to learn to drive and take my test so that I can get to sites.

Dear Lapwing,


